

PROJECT NAME:

NORTHERN CASS PASS

PROJECT LOCATION:

Former BNSF Railway corridor that is situated between the cities of Hunter, ND and Arthur, ND and immediately adjacent to State Highway 18. The attached map (Appendix A) depicts the location of the entire corridor plus the limits of this Transportation Alternatives Program Application. This TAP project will start at the intersection of County Road 34 and the corridor (located at the north edge of Arthur) and proceed north to County Road 26 approximately 3 miles (located at the trailhead).

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

CORRIDOR MASTERPLAN: The Cities of Hunter and Arthur Park Districts formed the Hunter/Arthur JPA Park Board in 2013 upon the decision of BNSF Railway to abandon their railway corridor between Hunter and Arthur. The JPA pursued the acquisition of this corridor through the Rails to Trails program and in fact successfully acquired the corridor in 2013. The objective of this acquisition is to build a multi-use, non-motorized path entitled Northern Cass Pass from the south edge of Arthur, north to the City of Hunter with the project ending at the Elm River Bridge: adjacent to the Hunter elevator. This corridor parallels ND Highway 18 with a total length of approximately 6 miles. The ultimate goal of the JPA is to construct a hard surface trail with an estimated total project cost approaching \$1.5 million. This Rails to Trails project was anticipated (and is proving to be) a multi-year project with several phases planned. The Northern Cass Pass project has received five ND RTP Grants: The first for the enhancement of the existing bridges on the corridor (to make the bridges safe for pedestrian and other non-motorized uses) in the amount of \$83,256 (Phase 1), the second for the surfacing of the entire corridor with recycled concrete/bituminous millings in the amount of \$120,000 (Phase 3), the third for beginning to pave the surface for \$120,000 (Phase 4), the fourth for additional paving of the project for \$124,000 (Phase 4) and the fifth Grant for paving in the summer of 2019 (\$124,000). The JPA has also received Outdoor Heritage Funding in the amount of \$185,171 for a preliminary phase (Phase 2) along the corridor which includes trail grading and prep, tree plantings, and trailhead work. This project has also been awarded a North Dakota Forestry Grant (American the Beautiful Grant) in the amount of \$5,000. In addition, the ND DOT has awarded the JPA a NDSTREETS grant in the total amount of \$124,683 for the relocation of 1100 feet of the trail (construction 2021). All amounts listed include the Local Match (ranging between 10% and 50%).

The goals of the JPA with Northern Cass Pass, is to create a separated, non-motorized corridor to provide safe passage between the cities of Hunter and Arthur for residents of the area as well as a destination location for specific community events. Additional benefits of this corridor include preservation of the 100 year history of the Great Northern Railway and BNSF as well as improving the quality of the existing wetlands which receive water from the large Right of Way, improving the wildlife habitat throughout this corridor and finally buffering agricultural lands and other natural resources from State Highway 18. The addition of "mini groves" of trees along the corridor will enhance the wildlife features, enrich the existing water quality benefits created by existing vegetation, provide additional wind erosion benefits for the adjacent agricultural lands, and finally to provide educational opportunities for all users of the trail.

The construction of the sustainable trail will provide a series of end results including recreational opportunities for local persons as well as visitors to the area, protection of existing wildlife habitats and natural resources, access to private and public lands for





sportsmen, improvement of water quality, soil conditions, plant diversity and animal systems and finally conserving the natural areas by protecting the established former Railway Right of Way. Also included in the overall vision of the project will be the construction of three separate trailheads (one at each end and one in the middle) which will provide information kiosks which will be used discuss amenities along the corridor as well as the history of the project.

ND TAP PROJECT: This TAP project will be a phase of the entire planned project (possibly the final phase depending upon paving bids). The project will consist of placing a hard surface (bituminous) on top of the existing aggregate surfacing beginning at STA 107+00 (this is the ending of the paving that took place in the Summer of 2018) and proceed north to County Road 26 within the corridor ROW approximately 2 miles and will stop at the intersection of the Northern Cass Pass corridor and Cass County Highway 26 (STA 213+00). The path will be placed on the center of the old railway ballast location (which is generally centered in the ROW and is currently of compacted concrete/asphalt millings). Appendix A depicts the location of the project in Northern Cass County as well as a detailed corridor map of the route. Also attached in Appendix A is a layout of this proposed project. The proposed paving is highlighted in pink.

PROJECT COST:

As stated earlier, the estimated cost for the entire corridor will be approaching \$1,500,000. This TAP project will be classified as Phase 6 of the Master Plan. Phase 1 is the ND RTP Grant project (2015) and Phase 2 is the Outdoor Heritage Fund project, Phases 3 and 4 (2018 construction) and Phase 5 (2019 Construction) is additional ND RTP Grant Projects.

Total costs for Phase 6 (and the basis for this application) are estimated to be \$135,000 (80% Federal share of \$112,500 and 20% Local Share of \$22,500). With the Phases 3 and 4 constructed in 2018, and Phase 5 being constructed in 2019, it is possible that this TAP grant would be able to finish paving the trail project. The detailed estimate located in Appendix B.

TAP CATEGORY:

TAP Category D: Conversion and use of abandoned railroad corridor for a trail for pedestrians, bicyclists, and other non-motorized transportation users. Appendix C depicts a typical non-motorized shared use path.





SUPPORTING DATA:

This Northern Cass Pass project has been identified by the Park Districts of Hunter, ND and Arthur, ND as part of their overall recreation plan. The two Park Districts have in fact formed a Joint Powers Authority in response to their dedication for the success of their master plan. The Northern Cass Pass corridor not only provides recreation opportunities for residents of Hunter and Arthur, but also for surrounding populations including the Northern Cass Public School.

Appendix D includes copies of documents of support for this project.

PUBLIC ACCESSIBILITY:

Owner of this project is the Hunter Arthur JPA. The corridor is bounded by State Highway 18 to the East (with numerous access areas along the corridor including a trailhead planned to be located near the middle of the length at Highway 26). Additional trailheads are also planned at each end (one at Arthur and one located in Hunter).

MATCHING FUNDS PROVIDED BY:

The 20% local match will be provided by the Hunter Arthur JPA, along with support from other public and private entities including various local endowment groups, local, state and federal grant sources.

RIGHT OF WAY:

No additional Right of Way will be needed to be acquired. The Hunter Arthur JPA has already purchased the Railway corridor (and accompanying Right of Way) through the National Rails to Trails program.

MAINTENANCE:

The Hunter Arthur JPA will maintain this project upon completion.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS:

The Hunter Arthur JPA addressed environmental impacts during the Rails to Trails acquisition of the corridor. Appendix E contains documentation of this, including correspondence received from various agencies. The Hunter Arthur JPA however, will re-visit all environmental clearances and





permits as required and necessary for this TAP application. The following briefly visits each category.

Land Use – Since the corridor lies along an existing State Highway Right of Way (TH 18), and with the corridor acquisition during the rails to trails program, the entire project lies within the right of way formerly owned by the BNSF Railroad and now fully owned by the Hunter Arthur JPA. There should not be a change in land use in the vicinity of this project.

Farmland — There are not any identified or foreseen impacts to farm land on the proposed project. All construction activity would/will be contained within existing ROW.

Social — This Northern Cass Pass project will have a positive impact upon the neighborhoods and communities of Arthur and Hunter. This project will create a shared use path that connects the two cities, and is adjacent to both rural and suburban developments as well as near the Northern Cass Public School

Economic – This project will affect the area's economy **positively** by increased tourism and use of the corridor.

Relocation – No people or business entity will be relocated due to this project.

Wetlands — No fill material will be placed in any wetlands due to this project. Efforts will be made to avoid wetlands when possible.

Flood Plain – The North Dakota State Water Commission has identified areas along the corridor which are designated as Zone A3. The project will coordinate with the local Floodplain Administrator during the development of this project. Appendix E includes a copy of the letter received from the North Dakota State Water Commission on this subject.

Threatened or Endangered Species – No threatened or endangered species were identified during the rails to trails process. Efforts will be made to continue investigating this.

Cultural Resources – No properties have been identified as part of the rails to trail process that would be eligible to be on the National Register of Historic Places. Efforts will continue investigating this.

Hazardous Waste — No hazardous wastes have been identified as part of the rails to trails process. Efforts will continue investigating this.







The proposed project has been reviewed by State Water Commission staff and the following comments are provided:

- There are floodplains identified and/or mapped where this proposed project is to take place. The areas are designated as a Zone A3. North Dakota has no formal "permitting" authority as a state entity in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) identified floodplain areas. The permitting is always done by the local entity, which has jurisdiction in the area in question. Please work closely with the City Floodplain Administrator. The Floodplain Administrator is: Tracy Bender; PO 56; Hunter, ND 58048; 701-306-0289. The NFIP map used to make this determination is Cass County, Panel 38018100A, Date 12/4/1979.
- It is the responsibility of the project sponsor to ensure that local, state and federal agencies are contacted for any required approvals, permits, and casements.
- All waste material associated with the project must be disposed of properly and not placed in identified floodway areas.
- No sole-source aquifers have been designated in ND.
